Reflection time: Our theme today is listening to Jesus. Jesus friends are sad and confused, life has not turned out as they expected. Have you ever had a time like that in your life? Share this with those you are with.

Bible passage: Luke 24: 13-35 (ask a member to read the passage, possibly from a child's Bible & allow space to reflect)

It is Sunday evening. On the Friday before, their best friend Jesus was nailed to a cross, where he died.

This morning some women went to the tomb where his dead body had been put, but they came back with a very strange story, saying that his body wasn't there! No wonder the friends were confused.

What a puzzle! The friends did not recognise Jesus, and he didn't seem to know what they were talking about. They explained to him why they were puzzled and sad. What did Jesus say to all this? He wanted to show them that God had planned the whole thing many, many years before. In fact, the whole story was there in the Bible.

Interactive Learning.....



Make the story. Using crackers, green icing and gummi bears recreate the story. Before you eat it imagine you were one of the friends, what would you ask Jesus? What would you most like Jesus to explain to you? Think of a really tricky question you would ask Jesus?

Guess......What is it????

You will need: A blindfold (scarf), some familiar objects

Jesus said it was better to believe without seeing. Take it in turns to wear the blindfold. Pass an object to the person wearing the blindfold, can they work out what it is without being able to see it?

You could think about how the object feels, how it smells, if it makes a sound. Maybe you will find out new things about the objects that you hadn't noticed before.

When Jesus spent time with his followers, they did not recognise him by how he looked but they experienced something new about who he was in the way he unlocked scripture to them.

When feeling the object how did you begin to recognise what it was? Was there something familiar, a shape, a texture?

Where you completely baffled? This is how the disciples felt, at first they were completely baffled, not sure but then there was also something vaguely familiar in the experience.


Create a Family or Group Journal

In your gathering/group, have a bible to hand & journal pages Call out a book of the bible and group members

Find the book of the bible. Ask the person with the bible to read out a couple of verses. Vary the books being found.

Remind the people gathered the bible is all about Jesus, Jesus taught the disciples the bible is all about him.

Jesus calls **US** to **follow** and **respond** to him.





Our resident theological thinker answers your questions.

This week's Questions is: What is the difference between a disciple and an apostle? From Tim Luff



The simple answer is that while a disciple is a student, one who learns from a teacher, an apostle is sent to deliver those teachings to others. "Apostle" means messenger, one who is sent. ... The word "apostle" today has two meanings, the larger meaning of a messenger and the narrow meaning to denote the twelve people directly linked to Jesus Christ. The term is sometimes also applied to others, especially Paul, who was converted to Christianity a few years after Jesus' death. In Luke 6:13 it states that Jesus chose 12 from his disciples "whom he named apostles," (see also Matthew 10:1-2) and in Mark 6:30 the Twelve are called Apostles when mention is made of their return from the mission of preaching and healing on which Jesus had sent them.

There is also the gift of apostleship which some church leaders have today. See Ephesians 4:11, I Corinthians 12:28, Acts 1:21-22, 1 Corinthians 9:1.

Mission

A message from our mission partners in Lille, France



Lockdown means doing and even learning to do lots of things we wouldn't normally do. For us, this has included:

- Taking the cat for a walk on a lead
- Prayer meetings and oral exams with students via Zoom
- Turning the office into a recording studio to produce a 3-minute sermon (See here for the result: https://christchurchlille.fr/events/sunday-19-april-2020-worship/ - my sermon is about 5 minutes, 15 seconds into the video)

We've also discovered that we've sometimes given "I don't have time" as the reason for not doing something, but now we do have time it still isn't done! Perhaps, we were kidding ourselves and the real reason was "I can't be bothered". In any case, a couple of those things have now been done and we have learned something about our true motivations.

At the moment it looks as if France will start coming out of lockdown on 11th May – this means that our Muslim neighbours will be confined for the first half of Ramadan, which is bound to cause a lot of frustration.

We hope you are all well and finding God's peace in this difficult time.

<u>Mission 2</u> <u>A message from our mission partners - Tearfund</u>



Our global team is providing a truly global response to help tackle this pandemic

Tearfund is present in more than 50 countries and we are doing all we can to stand with the most vulnerable people at this time.

People in poverty will be hit hardest by coronavirus. Millions do not have access to healthcare. Vital medical equipment, such as ventilators, is scarce. And for many families, being in lockdown means they are no longer able to earn money to feed their children. In places where malnutrition is already a problem, even more people face starvation.

We are adapting our programmes and finding new ways to safely support people in need, making sure no one is left behind.

Such as in Afghanistan, where one of our local partners is providing counselling services for staff, patients and their families at a hospital set up to treat patients with coronavirus. We are working alongside the health ministry in Afghanistan to distribute Personal Protective Equipment, to limit the spread and help those on the frontline safely serve people in need.

In Burundi more than half of all children suffer from malnutrition. Our feeding centres provide lifesaving support to new mothers and their babies. Determined to continue this vital service if the country goes into lockdown, our local partners have made plans to use home delivery kits. This will make sure vulnerable families still get the food and help they need to overcome malnutrition and survive.

The church is at its most effective being salt and light (Matthew 5:13-16) Rosa Camargo de Bravo, who leads Tearfund's work in Latin America and the Caribbean says that 'the temple is closed, but the church is not.' And I couldn't agree more as I see churches around the world united in stepping forward to help people in need.

Tearfund was born out of the compassion and generosity of the local church. And the church remains our greatest partner. We're training pastors to raise awareness of coronavirus to counter misinformation and limit the spread. This will make sure that vital public health information reaches even more people – particularly those who are marginalised and at risk.

Generosity knows no bounds

We're so grateful to have supporters like you, who even in the midst of a lockdown, are looking for ways to help people living in poverty battling this new threat. Thank you for your faithfulness to those we serve. As I speak to our teams around the world, they continue to share how much they value your prayers and support.

The threat is significant, and we want to do all we can to adapt and set up new programmes to make sure that vulnerable communities are not devastated by coronavirus.

These are challenging times for us all. But I know God remains in control. He is close to poor and broken-hearted people. We will weather this crisis as we have always done – by standing together in prayer and by following Jesus where the need is greatest.

We hope you're well and staying safe during this unprecedented time. Whilst some of our team are furloughed, we continue to look for ways we can provide support for schools when they reopen.

We understand that the needs may be very different when we are finally able to get back into schools and we know we will need to be nimble and prepared to adapt very quickly.

Mental health issues are right at the front of school concerns when the

children and young people return and we want to be there ready to support them and the staff when that happens.

The Armour of God



A few months ago, I went to my Granddaughter Esme's school to talk to her class about life as a Roman soldier. They were studying the Romans in their history lessons. They really enjoyed meeting a real live Roman legionary and had lots of questions to ask. Esme's school is very close to where they live but has no parking facilities. This meant that I had to change in Esme's house and walk to her school. People who I passed on my way were very amused.

I was reminded of the visit to Esme's school when Ephesians 6 verses 10-20 was given to us in our Daily Bread bible readings recently. The subject of the passage is "the Armour of God". After reading the passage I went into our office to look at the photo of me dressed in my legionaries' outfit. This well-known passage uses the various components of a suit of armour of the time - presumably Roman, as a visual aid to various aspects relating to the Christian Life: -

The breastplate righteousness

Footwear readiness to spread the good news of the Gospel

Shield faith Helmet salvation

Sword ...of the spirit - the word of God

Belt Truth

We need to put on the Armour of God to deal with this virus that is affecting our lives.

In this passage, Paul tells the Ephesians to pray in the Spirit on all occasions using all kinds of prayers and requests. Now is the time to "bombard" God with our pleas to end the spread of the Coronavirus.






#Live Lent

Ann's simple recipes for everyone

St Paul's resident culinary queen Ann Easter shares some of her recipes with you.

Coconut cake



Ingredients

8oz / 225g Self raising flour

4oz / 120g Butter

2oz / 60g Desiccated coconut

2oz / 60g Sugar

2 eggs

6oz / 170g Icing sugar

Instructions

Sift the flour into a mixing bowl.

Beat the eggs and add to the bowl along with the sugar, butter and desiccated coconut.

Mix the ingredients well until they form a creamy consistency.

Grease a 7" / 18cm cake tin.

Add the mix and level with a spoon.

Bake at gas mark 4 for 1hour or 150c for 50 minutes. Check with a skewer that the cake is cooked.

When the cake is cold, mix the icing sugar with a small amount of water until it is a thin paste. Mix in a handful of coconut and spread onto the cake.

Blast from the Past

From "St Pauls Parish News April 1975"

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PARISH PROFILE

A SERIES in which Len Hollingsworth finds out about personalities in the parish:

Full church membership can be greedy of both time and talents. Yet the church which lives only to itself is a denial of its witness, and so it is that BRENDA REID has not become a member of any of our church organisations, in order to be the efficient Secretary of BECHA - the Bexley Churches Housing Association.

"I'm not evangelically-minded as far as words are concerned, nor a proselytizer. My interests are more practical - hence the job I do. Ten years ago, shortly after the family had moved to our present house in Park Crescent, I was approached by the Rev. Peter Absolom who, with Mrs. Dorothy Sharpley, was the driving force behind the founding of BECHA at that time. They knew that I was a qualified secretary until my daughter Susan was born and was at the time 'not gainfully employed'. So I started work, for an Association whose workers are all voluntary and whose offices are our fourth bedroom!"

Born in South Chingford just before the War, and always a church-goer, Brenda moved to Belvedere on her marriage to husband Eric. In 1971 she was calling upon the then new incumbent of St. Paul's to introduce herself and her association when she noticed a pile of cards promoting the Tortoise Club. Susan, then ten, became a member and later joined the Guides, and Mum began attending our Family Service.

"But I'm nobody's saint", explains Brenda. "Since I try to listen with patience and compassion to those in need who unburden themselves, I'm sometimes irritable with the family as a result. For relaxation I enjoy reading, such as catching up on the classics or a good historical novel. I also like listening to Mozart, Gilbert and Sullivan, and can even say that I prefer one screaming teenager to another on 'Top of the Pops'. Apart from that, I like travel and have begun to share my husband's interest in archeology, which has taken us to Tunisia, Rhodes and Crete. Finally, I like watching football on television. I'm a 'Spurs supporter!"

"The very fact that voluntary Housing Associations exist seems to indicate that something is wrong?"

"Yes, of course. Since 1945 there has been a very steep decline in privately-rented accommodation. This is largely the result of a number of acts since the war which have given greater security to tenants. Elderly landlords, fearing difficulties in evicting an unsatisfactory tenant, have decided not to offer housing. In London one must have one's name on a council housing list for at least eighteen months (double in Inner London) before being considered for a home. For many a mortgage is out of the question, and so the voluntary associations have a part to play."

"Since we commenced operations in November 1966
we've housed 140 families in our 23 units. Most of them
are at our end of the Borough, where property is cheaper,
for almost all our units are being purchased with a
mortgage from the Borough. With the passing of the 1974
Housing Act we can look forward to the continued
expansion of our work if we so wish, for with more than
about 35 units one needs permanent paid officials.
Wherever possible we try to help families, and the
average group is four in number. We don't cater for the
elderly, but do look after one-parent families. Frequently
our customers are referred to us from the Borough, but
they must all be either living or working in Bexley.
We'll then give them a roof over their heads for from six
months to three years."

"You probably have well-intentioned offers of all sorts of furniture, regardless of its suitability, don't you?"

"Yes, but our major need at present is for someone to offer premises as a store for the furniture. It might be a garage, or any waterproof premises which we could use. If any reader has this sort of accommodation, or knows where some might be found, I'd be very pleased to hear from them."
