Phishing Scams

Please be careful when receiving cold calls, suspicious letters or unsolicited emails and texts. Here is one Colin has heard of:

A scam which is aimed at potential users of Morrisons and Tesco. This involves tricking people into paying a small amount of money £1 usually, to get a voucher for 'free' shopping. The aim of the scam is to get users to reveal their banking/credit card details. There is **no such scheme** and if anyone receives **any** messages from **any** source, they are scams. Always check the website address to ensure that it begins with **https:// the 's' is proof of a secure site for the supermarket.** These crooks have copied the legitimate site information to construct a 'look-alike' one, but cannot use the **'s'.**




Jesus had been warning the disciples he would be leaving them and they were becoming worried, how were they to follow if they didn't know where he was going. Jesus then goes onto to say why he is going – to prepare a place for them. Thinking back to your person who's knocking on the door and invites you to stay How would they prepare for you to stay with them?

If that person knows you, they are likely to be preparing activities or food they know you like.... Because they know you, they have a relationship with you. How about a celebrity – they do not know you, so you would have to trust them that they had something or somewhere good for you to go. Jesus asked the disciples to **TRUST** him but he also knew them as friends, Jesus makes a promise, a word of comfort to his disciples.


Interactive Learning.....

What matters most

There is a deeply haunting story by Tolstoy titled 'What men live by'. which I happened to re-read recently. The story goes that a poor shoemaker despairing of his debt goes out on a cold evening, gets drunk and on his way home sees a naked man lying by the road. The shoemaker takes pity on the man and takes him home. The stranger ends up staying with the shoemaker for several years, all the while observing people in different situations. In the end the stranger reveals himself to be an erring angel who had been sent to learn what really matters to men. Through a series of very interesting situations he concludes that what people live by is love.

Now this is purely a work of fiction from one of the greatest writers of all time, who incidentally also spent a lot of time pondering on what Jesus actually taught. But not many can dispute that there is truth in the fact that love, whether we understand the workings of it or not, is central to our lives. There is a lot already written about love but this story is different - it is about how we are essentially wired, taking into account how very fragile our existence is. It speaks volumes in times of uncertainly - such as what we are going through now.

Understanding what makes us tick is really quite complicated, especially if you consider recent advances in psychology - the writings of Freud, Jung and many others; the solution is often summed up as 'finding yourself', 'being true to yourself'. Whilst there is a lot of value in trying to know oneself, I don't think knowing oneself, as fully as one can, is the answer to what life is all about. Psychiatry and counselling can help you know yourself and come to terms with what happens in your life, but that only seems like half the answer. Surely our journey as Christians doesn't stop at just getting an understanding of ourselves.

All of us through the various stages of our life undertake a journey; to find ourselves first, and then ourselves in relation to others. In all probability it takes a life time to understand what really matters to us.

It is not surprising then that most death-bed accounts talk about the person dying making sure near and dear know how much he or she loves them.

There are still though many hard questions about death and suffering in the world, especially in the face of thousands already being killed by this pandemic in just two months. We are all seeking some rationale to why such horrifying things happen, so often across history. What resonated with me in this context was an article I read fairly recently in the New York Times (by Ross Douthat), which pointed out that whilst it was easy to presume the messages God was sending the world through suffering, natural disasters and pandemics; most ordinary Christians the writer knew stay away from attempting to answer the "why?" question - they point to Job whose friends were rebuked by God for trying to do precisely that.

Now this is not to say there aren't any theological answers to the conundrum of suffering; in fact, there are a range of answers given by eminent theologians across the centuries, but none of them deny the reality of suffering. Suffering comes to all.

Christians or not, but as Christians we believe God not only entered a world filled with suffering but also that through the incarnation in Jesus sided with those who suffer and suffered himself. The reality of lives being lost is written large across our TV screens on a daily basis these days - with pictures of family members grieving and lamenting their loss. Like everything in life, there is a time for joy and a time for lamentation. There were times when Jesus also grew weary and grieved.

Lamenting in itself is a very natural response; and there is no explaining it away - it hits people hard. It is but important to understand that lamenting or grieving at its core is an acknowledgment of love for the other - an acknowledgment that the thread of love is at the root of our existence, which ends not just with us, but also links us to God who in Jesus lived in solidarity with our pain.

Mission

Update from our mission partner, Tearfund.



Coronavirus is spreading among some of the world's poorest communities. Time is running out to help them.

Many of us will have spent this season with a real sense of fear and uncertainty. Our churches have had to quickly adapt to deeply challenging circumstances. Who could have predicted that we would have to celebrate the triumph of Jesus without being able to meet face to face?

We've seen for ourselves the enormous disruption this virus can cause. Yet for people living in extreme poverty the impact could be unthinkable.

In Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh, the largest refugee camp in the world, cramped conditions mean it's impossible to keep a safe distance from people. And there aren't enough handwashing facilities. The virus could spread through the camp like wildfire – threatening the half a million Rohingya people who live there. People whose lives were already a struggle.

Our local church partners are on the frontline, and they need your prayers more than ever.

'We are distributing leaflets about handwashing, distancing and recognising the symptoms,' says Sudarshan Kodooru, Tearfund's Country Director in Bangladesh. 'We have given out hygiene kits, but getting access to the [refugee] camps is likely to become even harder. The handpumps and sanitation facilities we've been able to provide will be more important than ever.'

The scale of the work required is huge, but we know that the prayerful support of your church and others around the UK will be powerful and effective (James 5:16). Our teams on the ground will take a huge amount of strength from knowing that the saints are joined together in prayer for them.

Our resident theological thinker answers your questions.


This week's Questions is: In my Bible is a part called The Apocrypha. What is it?

"Apocrypha" comes from a Greek word which means "things that are hidden, secret." The Old Testament Apocrypha, often referred to simply as "the Apocrypha," is a collection of Jewish books that are included in the Old Testament canons of Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox Christians, but not of Protestants. It was Martin Luther in his translation of the bible who affirmed the unique authority of the Hebrew canon, stating that the books of the Apocrypha were useful for reading but that was all they were not to be considered as part of the canon and were consigned to the back of the bible. Over time, however, the Apocrypha has fallen into disuse amongst many Christians and in some bibles, they do not appear at all.

The Roman Catholic Apocrypha consists of Tobit, Judith, the Additions to Esther, the Additions to Daniel (the Prayer of Azariah and the Three Young Men, Susanna, and Bel and the Dragon), the Wisdom of Solomon, Ecclesiasticus (also called Sirach), Baruch (also called 1 Baruch), the Letter of Jeremiah, 1 Maccabees, and 2 Maccabees. The Greek Orthodox Church adds 1 Esdras, Psalm 151, the Prayer of Manasseh, and 3 Maccabees, with 4 Maccabees in an appendix. The Russian Orthodox Church adds 1 Esdras, 2 Esdras, Psalm 151, and 3 Maccabees. The Roman Catholic canon places the Prayer of Manasseh, 1 Esdras, and 2 Esdras in an appendix without implying canonicity. So you can see not all Christian denominations even agree what should be in the Apocrypha.

The War and V.E. Day 8th May 1945



I was born on 19th September 1940 at 29 Colyers Lane, just opposite the Old Vicarage, during the Battle of Britain and three weeks later my mother, two sisters aged 9 and 11 years and myself were evacuated to Trowbridge in Wiltshire to escape the bombing. My father stayed at home as he was employed in the engineering industry.

We did return home for a few days in January 1944 but unfortunately it is recorded that some 450 German aircraft made a bombing raid that Friday evening. The warning siren sounded and we took


cover in our little Anderson air raid shelter in our garden.

We huddled together, burying our faces in our laps, as though this offered extra protection from the bombs. One dropped on the playing fields about 100 yards from the vicarage severely damaging the houses opposite, killing one person and injuring nine others. Our home had lost its roof tiles and windows.

In contrast, I can remember when the war ended and peace was declared in Europe. It was a great celebration with parties organised over the whole country. Northumberland Heath was no exception; in East Holme (just off Heath Way) Union Jack flags and bunting were strung from houses with a children's party with whatever rationed food allowed followed by a party for the adults with dancing and singing after a piano was dragged out of someone's house. Peace at last!





Ann's simple recipes for everyone

St Paul's resident culinary queen Ann Easter shares some of her recipes with you.

Sultana Cake



Ingredients

8oz / 250g Self raising flour

4oz / 120g Butter

4oz / 120g Sultanas

1 Large egg

2oz / 60g Sugar

1 teaspoon Mixed spice

Instructions

Beat the egg

Sift the flour into a large mixing bowl and add the other ingredients (including the egg).

Mix until you have a thick cake batter.

Place the batter into a 7" / 18cm greased cake tin.

Bake on gas mark 4 for 1 hour or 160c for 50mins. Check with a skewer that the cake is cooked through.
