Together:


We will light three lights for the trinity of love: God above us, God beside us, God beneath us; The beginning, The end and the Everlasting one.

Reflection time:



Read the saying by St Ligouri, reflect and/or share with those who you gather with the following?

- Do you have a habit, if so what is it?
- Did it start suddenly or did it gradually happen?

It is now 40 days after Easter when Jesus died and rose again. During those 40 days Jesus has been appearing to all his disciples at different times and in different places but on the 40th day he appeared for one last time. They were friends and spent a lot of time together before and after Jesus death, do you think the disciples had pick up habits from Jesus, if so, pause and wonder what they would be?

Interactive Learning......

When we spend time with people we often pick up their habits or we notice their habits, it becomes part of them part of their personality and we love them for it. Jesus often spoke to God or spoke of God with the tone or knowing God, being familiar with God and being able to come before him with confidence as if he was sitting right next to us. Just as the disciples saw Jesus as a close friend and learnt "Holy Habits" from him and also thinking of how St Alphonsus encourages us — let us acquire a habit of being with Him, with confidence and being with someone very close so we don't feel alone and more like the disciples who had a very important mission to tell people and Jesus...... As we look forward to Pentecost let us practice those "Holy Habits".

Ascension Bubbles: Activity and Prayer for Ascension Day

You will need: A plastic bottle or glass jar, water, vegetable oil, food colouring, Alka seltzer tablets



Fill a bottle or jar halfway full with water and mix in some food colouring.

Now fill the rest of the bottle with oil, leaving a small space at the top.

The oil will separate from the water into a separate layer.

Drop an Alka Seltzer tablet (or try a quarter or half at a time if they are large tablets) into the bottle and watch as bubbles of coloured water start to ascend into the oil layer in the style of a mini lava lamp!

Watch the bubbles rising and think about the sight of Jesus ascending and what that might have meant for the disciples. What might they have been thinking/ feeling? What does it feel like to wait for something, as the disciples had been told to go and wait for the Holy Spirit to come?


Re in act the following version of 'the Great Commission' with the suggested actions:

Go (point forward with one arm and finger outstretched)

Into all the world (describe a tiny circle with your outstretched finger and then make that circle bigger and bigger)

And share the good news (cup hands together and offer 'the contents' around to people left and right)
With everybody, everywhere (rapidly point to everyone in the whole group and beyond)
And I will be with you.

Just wait, stop in Jerusalem until you receive the promise.



Whilst creating chat about the following questions & Share stories.....

- What "Holy Habits", behaviours or how to act did Jesus teach about? (Remember the parables too)
- Is there a habit you need to stop in order to take up a new habit? think about how you are spending your time
- Think of a habit you can practised this week to be part of Jesus important mission?

Mission

Another update from our mission partner Beryl Baker



Beryl is a nurse who works in Paraguay. She has been on the mission field for over 50 years and we have supported her as a mission partner throughout that time.

A message from Beryl's friend Eileen Hollingsworth

Paraguay has been in lock down like us since the end of March and Beryl was unable to leave the ranch in the Chaco. She was able about two weeks ago to travel a shorter distance to Lomo Plata where she was able to pick up medical supplies from the retired Doctor Trudy who normally helps Beryl with medical trips to the Indian villages.

The villages are shut down and only the men who have motor bikes can travel to Beryl's clinic on the ranch. Beryl told me she can see patients there and provide medicines for blood pressure, diabetes and epilepsy.

I think she was legally able to visit the capital Asuncion because she brought down with her a patient who needed to go to the hospital.

The difficulty that Beryl had was that her 20-year-old vehicle had old spark plugs that no longer started the vehicle. A car mechanic on the ranch called Tito was able to start the engine but Beryl had to drive to Asuncion by keeping the engine going for the whole journey.

Paraguay has been able to stop the Covid 19 virus spreading and have only had 10 deaths. The businesses in Asuncion are all closed apart from Food shops and chemists and Beryl is hoping that today Saturday 16th May 2020 a friend who is a car mechanic will able to put new plugs into the vehicle and get it going normally. The same safe guards for health are being used In Paraguay like facemasks and social distancing but they are also using disinfectants to keep shoes clean and entrances to buildings safe.

Beryl has been able to get help for the villagers in the Chaco thanks to the help of a man called John Holland who created a charitable Christian organisation in Paraguay a number of years ago. This man has been unable to leave Paraguay since the lock down and is living I with other expatriates in a hotel in a hotel in Asuncion and he organised food to be sent up to the Chaco where Beryl with the help of one of her health promotors get food distributors in Sombero Piri. Beryl has a two-way radio which helps her to contact the health promotors that she works with in the villages.

There is a church office for St Andrews Church in Asuncion, but like all our offices is closed but Beryl is in touch with Miriam who works from home at present. Fortunately, she has been able speak to the Ranch owner Rhett Butler by phone and he will be able to help Beryl settle all her outstanding accounts. Beryl at present can use her ATM in Asuncion but she is unable to do any online banking as she can only access her account by landline phone calls to the UK as the bank does not seem to accept what's app calls from Beryl's iPhone for security reasons.

Despite all of these difficulties Beryl sounded very cheerful and full of faith for her safety and wellbeing. The government were doing their best to help those unable to work with cash

pay outs and her house and Jordy the young man who is looking after house was supported by Sharon the 80-year-old American Christian friend who has always supported Beryl in her work for many years. This was because Beryl could not get to town for over two months.

Now we know that life for Beryl has had all the extra difficulties of the virus but she has been well supported by all the prayers that have been offered for her and she has been very certain of God's presence during this difficult time for everyone.

The Other Side

Now here's an interesting question, what would life be for you if you weren't a Christian? I don't mean the not going to the church kind, but having no religious belief whatsoever.

No big deal, a lot of people would say and probably add that they know many people who aren't religious, including some of their good friends and many of their family members. We all know people who believe in making a success of this life, and think of prayer as a bit of mumbo jumbo. They are usually self-reliant and make their way in life rather heroically.

How different would life be if you were with the other side – those with no belief in God. It would be, I imagine, difficult to see a noticeable change overnight. One would still get up, go to work if one works, and in general try to enjoy life as much as one can. You would in time try to develop your own philosophy of life or follow others who are similarly not religious. There is though the fact that you are in a large measure what you think, and as your view of your own existence changes so would the way you react to circumstances.

There would be ups and downs, and as it is for all of us, and at times nothing would make sense. In your quieter moments you would sometimes wonder what it's really all about. Life may feel very much as described by Shakespeare in Macbeth:

"'a tale told by an idiot, full of sound and fury, signifying nothing."

You wouldn't try to dwell on complex issues like good and evil as that might lead you to abstract notions. You would be looking for answers but soon realise how narrow our own vision is which cannot see beyond the immediate, how quickly your circumstances can change and how powerless the human body is against disease and death. You would realise there is really very little that you control.

Whilst you may think you have got away from moral dilemmas and judgments which people always think as belonging in the realm of

faith, one is still beset by rights and wrongs in the normal course of life. You would still be judged by yourself and the society around you. The load gets heavier - it is hard going.

There was an interesting article in the 'Independent' I read last year talking about someone (of no belief whatsoever) describing what it was to live with a Christian - an interesting observation made by him was: "when my partner panics or finds herself in a dilemma, sometimes the best thing I can say to her is, 'Let your faith guide you'. It speaks to her, calms her, and brings clarity while communicating that I trust in her decision-making faculties — whereas, if she said that to me, I'd plunge further into uncertainty."

There it is - the sense of uncertainty at the bottom of one's being in the quagmire of unbelief.

There is then the other way; of placing trust in the goodness of God. God understands the heavy burden of journeying alone; and offers a clear invitation in Christ's words;


"Come to Me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest". Added to that is also the gift of divine peace in our lives, "My peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." It all though hinges on the choice which people make; to either accept God with them in their journey of life or to go it alone.

It all sounds simple, but life seldom pans out like a well preached sermon. People may well choose to continue on the path they have chosen, and accuse the other side of living an illusion. As a Christian, one would no doubt accept that God loves the unbeliever too, and hope they find the peace that you have found in faith. You would support them and love them as you know God has loved you too.

In the end what people really believe in their hearts, for all the different things they say, always remains a mystery. There are people who aggressively avoid the mention of church and worship, but in times of trouble say a silent prayer. There is also the oft quoted saying that not many die as atheists. Who knows what changes in thinking may come about in the fullness of time, and who's to judge a person's relationship with their maker?



After being in digs in Woolwich I moved in with a friend's family in Plaxtol Road, Erith. Graham was a member of St. Paul's YCF – Young Churchman's Fellowship. I went with him to "Friday Nighters" which met in the curate's house (Jack McGinley) in Belmont Road. It was at that first visit that I met my future wife – Monica. It was not long before I was attending services at St. Paul's – my whole life was to change.

A group of St. Paul's YCF went to Central Hall Westminster to mark the publication of Youth Praise 1. We began to use it at our Sunday afternoon meetings in Jack's house. My very first Christian song which I sang and played on my guitar was Youth Praise 61 –"Jesus is the Saviour. "Graham and I played this song over and over.

Music was important to the fellowship at St. Paul's. We had a large choir. The vicar, Chris Gane played Spanish guitar. A recent choir master and organist, Clive Simmons was co-writer of "I want to walk with Jesus Christ". This was written while on a St. Paul's House Party in Switzerland in 1964. He also wrote a sung communion service which was used regularly.

In 1950, The well-known hymn writer Timothy Dudley-Smith was curate at St. Paul's. He wrote hundreds of hymns including "Lor@for the Years". He eventually became Bishop of Thetford.

In the 60's and 70's I regularly played my guitar and sung at services and meetings at St. Paul's.

In 1980, I took the starring role in "Follow the Star" This was a musical featuring the Angel Gabriel. The feature song was – "Every time you're good, you grow a bit, you grow a little bit more" At the end of the show I was wearing platform shoes. A large cast of St Paul's people performed this every night for a week to packed houses.

In the 80's we performed "The Witness". This was another musical. The curate Alan Glasby starred as Peter. This was performed all over the Deanery. There were so many people turned up to see the performance at St. Andrews Bostal Heath, that we gave two performances, back to back. It was a long evening.

In the 70's, 80, s and 90's there were a number of worship groups at St. Paul's: Wayfound, 3 in One, Quintessance and New Wine. Monica and I were in Quintessance and Bob played guitar and sang with New Wine.

Keith McGill (Alison's Dad.) wrote "Behold your King". It had a full orchestra and a large cast. It took me 6 months to grow my beard to fit the part of Peter.

It is many years since St. Paul's last had a choir. "The Band" leads worship currently. This comprises myself on guitar and vocals, Monica is our keyboard player, Alison plays flute, Ramsey is our percussionist and vocalist and Carol sings. We lead the singing at the 10.30 am service and Monica and I lead at the 9.00 am Communion service once a month. George Stafford plays the organ for the 9.00 worshipers, also once a month. Our vicar Clive encourages us to sing some of the many new worship songs that are available – we do our best.

At the age of 70, I look back over 50 years of serving God in the musical life of St. Paul's. I often say to Monica "will I be doing this when I am 80!!!! "There must be someone out there who can take over. Before I hang up my plectrum I would like us all to sing – "Jesus is the Saviour" The chorus goes – " for God so loved the world that he gave , His only begotten Son. That who so ever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life"

Ann's simple recipes for everyone

St Paul's resident culinary queen Ann Easter shares some of her recipes with you.

Crispy Bacon & Feta Cheese Salad

Ingredients

4 rashers Bacon
1/2 Lettuce
1 Cucumber
12 Cherry tomatoes
2 beetroot
12 red grapes
Extra virgin olive oil
5oz / 150g Feta Cheese



Instructions

Fry the bacon until crispy and cut into 1" / 2cm pieces.

Ann's top tip
Substitute the olive
oil with sweet chilli
sauce for an extra
kick!

Shred the lettuce and place on plates.

Cut the cucumber, beetroot & feta cheese into 1" / 2cm pieces.

Slice the cherry tomatoes and grapes in two.

Put the cucumber, tomatoes, beetroot, grapes and feta cheese in a bowl. Drizzle olive oil over and mix.

The mixture can then be spooned on to the lettuce you plated earlier.

Finally add the warm bacon on top to finish the salad.


