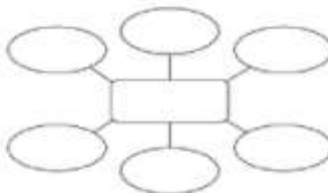

The World: Place a picture of the world or a map on a table/or on the grass – think of some recent headlines and/or print them out and place on the world. At this station, pray for those who are working towards peace in our world, and those who are struggling in unjust situations.

The Community: Place a map, or large photo on a table or on the grass parts of your community. Put coloured blocks of the map to indicate places of significance. At this station pray for those in your community who are struggling and finding life difficult.

The Church: Place some symbols out that represent your church. Place things around that represent your normal church activities. At this station pray for the life of the church, its contacts and for those who serve and lead and ways in which to make new contacts in the community.

Ourselves: Prop up a mirror & place pictures of people around it. Pray for yourselves & those you love, that you may choose each day to follow Jesus & know life in all its fullness.

Ask Lauraine

Our resident theological thinker answers your questions.

This week's Questions is: Do people get processed by demons today like they did in Jesus' time?

One of the incidents that appears in all three Synoptic Gospels (Matthew 8:28-34, Mark 5:1-20 and Luke 8:26-37) is the story of the Gerasenes Demoniac. Each time I hear these accounts there are questions they raise with me about the issue of demon possession.

There has often been criticism of Christians by atheists, who are cynical about numerous faith issues, one of which is that there was no demoniac possession. Jesus was just dealing with medical conditions, such as epilepsy. And, in all fairness, in one or two incidents, such as the one when a young child has fits and throws himself in fire, this could be the root cause of the illness. So, the first question I want to address is, 'Was there really demon possession at the time of Jesus?'

The first problem we have (if we are cynical about demons, and say they don't exist) is why did the demon possessed man say, in Luke's account, 'Why are you bothering me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God?' This comes over time and time again in incidents when Jesus deals with the demon possessed. The demons know exactly who Jesus is – the Son of God – and this fact in itself makes them fear the power he has over them. They have the power to enter someone and possess them, but Jesus has the power to overcome this possession. The knowledge the demons have about who Jesus really is, is intriguing, something which I cannot explain. Ironically, although the demons know exactly who Jesus is, the people Jesus ministers to do not.

The second problem we have (if we want to be cynical about demons), 'What about the extent of the possession?' When asked, again in Luke's account, 'What is your name?' by Jesus, the demoniac replies, 'Legion...for the man was filled with many demons.' A Roman Legion was between 3,000 and 6,000 men. In the Church of England, ministers occasionally have to deal with 'possible' cases of demon possession. I say possible, because in most cases what we are actually dealing with is schizophrenia, someone claiming to have many voices coming from within them.

Was the demoniac a schizophrenic? (with multiple voices in his head). Two observations suggest no. Firstly, the man had extraordinary strength. Luke tells us, 'Even when he was shackled with chains, he simply broke them.' Schizophrenia is not associated with extra-ordinary strength. Secondly, when the demons asked Jesus to put them in to the herd of pigs, an unclean animal to the Jews, we read, 'So the demons came out of the man and entered the pigs, and the whole herd plunged down the steep hillside into the lake, where they drowned.' This could not be explained by the man just

being a schizophrenic. There is no way a schizophrenic's illness can be transmitted in this way to someone or something else.

There is one other question I want to ask, 'Why are there very, very few (if any) reported cases of demon possession today?' I don't know the answer to that question! May be there are; but without Jesus to confront these demons, we are unaware of their existence!

So, ultimately, when we read about evil, such as demon possession, like the Gerasenes demoniac, what can we take out of such incidents and apply to today's world? C.S. Lewis's 'The Screwtape Letters' is about a senior devil training a junior devil. The senior devil informs his apprentice that there are two ways humans can fall into the trap of evil. Firstly, by not acknowledging evil exists. In that way when it does humans are not prepared and can't cope. Secondly, by acknowledging that evil is a very powerful force to be afraid of and more powerful than good. In that way humans readily give in when evil afflicts them.

From the passage in Luke, the first thing we can say is that there is no doubt evil does exist in the world. We know that already simply because of all the suffering that we see in the world. A new baptism liturgy has been produced by the Church of England which removed the word evil. Why? People were uncomfortable with the concept of evil and didn't want to acknowledge it exists (that would be falling into the first 'screwtape' trap).

At the end of Luke's account, however, we find 'the man who had been possessed by demons sitting quietly at Jesus' feet, clothed and sane.' The man had been completely transformed! And that should make us realise that, ultimately, good is more powerful than evil (we should not fall into the second 'screwtape' trap). Jesus held power over demons 2,000 years ago, and he still does today.

Perhaps our viewpoint on evil should fall somewhere between the two 'screwtape' traps, i.e. acknowledge that evil does exist, but that ultimately it has limited power, as Jesus has already conquered evil. Think of the battle between good and evil as being already won, but evil refuses to give up, and acts rather like a sniper, still trying to inflict damage when it can.

I've not answered the question fully, but theologians spend their whole lives trying to answer such questions!

So, I leave the final word to the Bible - James (4: 7) tells us 'Resist the devil, and he will flee from you.'

Stay close to God and with the Holy Spirit's power we can prevent evil thoughts or actions taking hold of us!

The Rainbow Promise

A reflection on Genesis 9: 12- 17

It is amazing how this passage is on God's rainbow promise. Throughout this season people have expressed their gratitude and thanks to frontline workers by drawing a picture of the rainbow and putting it at the front of their windows. It is a mystery how the rainbow is the picture that is being used to express our gratitude to those brave frontline workers, out of all other designs they could have used, they used the rainbow.

The rainbow was a symbol of God's covenant with man and the earth following the destruction of man in which only Noah and his 3 Sons and their families survived. God then made a covenant with man and the earth that he will not destroy man or the earth by water and the rainbow would be a sign of that Covenant

The use of the rainbow during this pandemic was first used in Italy with the slogan Audra tutto benne meaning (everything will be alright). The rainbow depicts better times to come.

And so, I ask why God made a covenant with man that he will not destroy us. After all he is God. He can do anything and he is a righteous God. The answer is simple; God is love and he is full of compassion. When it comes to man, especially those who love him, he cannot act out of character.

His love for mankind is unsearchable and unexplainable. In fact, the psalmist is so perplexed that he asks "what is man that though art mindful of him". That means we are always in God's mind. He is constantly seeking ways to lead us to operate under his kingdom so that we can enjoy his love and peace.

Even his plans are not of evil but they are of good to prosper us, to give us a future and a hope. Jeremiah 29:11. He is constantly planning for our good. He is always thinking good thoughts of us. He has even created us in his image. We bear his image both male and female so that in his likeness we are called children of God. Parents can do anything for their children for their good. The bible says God has lavished us with his love.

He has made a covenant with us not to destroy us because he is full of compassion and merciful. He does not afflict willingly or grieve the Children of men. Lam 3:33. It is not in his nature to see us suffer. God want us to know this through a visible sign of the rainbow. The rainbow is a spectrum of light which describes the presence of God as light. God has created a picture to show that he is in solidarity with us.

God therefore made a covenant with man because he is merciful. Through the Lord's mercies we are not consumed because his compassion never fails.

For this reason, let us not allow our minds to be contaminated neither by the news or social media or any means that the enemy will use to cause us fear. Even when we hear the alarming news all around us, alarming as it may be let us be even more mindful of God's unfailing love for us. He is slow to anger and full of love and faithfulness.

As we walk through our neighbourhood and see the rainbow paintings on windows let us be reminded that God is not a destroying God. Let us see it as an opportunity to renew our minds and say to our souls that God has loved us with an everlasting love.

In the same way we honour our NHS workers and feel proud of them, let us honour our God, surrender to God and be energised.

Let the eyes of our hearts and minds be saturated with love of God as a covenant keeping God. Deut 4:31 sums it up that "God is a covenant keeping God. For the Lord our God is a merciful God. He will not leave us or destroy us or forget the covenant with our father that he swore to them.

Speak to the Holy Spirit in prayer and hymns and thanksgiving that he alone is our hero for He heals, He redeems, He forgives, He delivers, He holds our hands and crowns our lives with loving kindness, tender mercies, glory and honour.

We have a covenant with God and no other and that covenant is a reminder of his love and our hope in him.

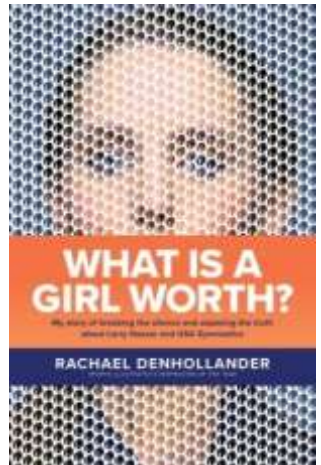


All Things New by Pete Hughes

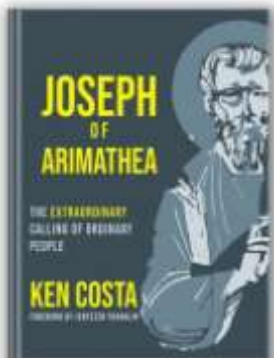
What is a Girl Worth? By Rachael Denhollander

A Bit of Drama

It's fair to say that most people like a bit of drama, and by and large the shows we like are those which grip us. Quite often the story grows in our mind and we come away wondering whether that's how the characters should or should not have behaved, or perhaps how would we have handled things.

Some TV dramas, for whatever reason, seem to catch people's curiosity and end up generating high viewing figures. This is how it turned out to be for the recently aired BBC drama 'Normal People' based on a novel written by Sally Rooney. Both the novel and the drama have had good reviews generally but also a fair share of criticism for the needless vulgarity shown.

The title of book and the TV drama 'Normal People' is curiously interesting; implying that this is how most ordinary people lead their lives and react to situations.

The storyline is fairly common - Connell and Marianne who have known each other since their school years fall in love, break up, meet up later and part again. Both of them are at an age where they don't really understand the depth of feeling they have for each other. As the story progresses, the veneer of defiant choices in life slowly peel off to reveal a deep emotional vulnerability in both.

Although the novel is set in Ireland, there is nothing explicitly Christian (in the devotional sense) about the story, and some scenes may indeed seem gratuitous and unnecessary. And yet the story in the main is quite poignant - two people going through life, reacting not as saints but as 'normal people'. It shouldn't take a great leap of imagination to ask if this is how normal people live their lives, ¹⁹who then are those who choose not to live in such a way? Would it exclude people who don't subscribe to making casual choices in life or those who take life a bit more



seriously? However, that may be, there is also the fact that art reflects life, and what we see there is in some ways a reflection of what the world seems to be from a certain point of view.

What is plainly evident is the fact of a generational shift; the pattern of life which society expected some years ago has changed. There has always been an awareness that religious belief has mostly existed within the margins of people's lives, and now those margins have moved even further - to the point that people seem to be embarrassed to talk about their faith. It is also true that people on the outside often feel 'good Christians' are simply too embarrassed to acknowledge the messy circumstances of people in the real world. The drama does reveal the sad underbelly of modern life which, if you like, you could either condemn or take that as step in understanding what life really is like for those starting out in the 21st century.

It has to be said that most people by and large lead decent lives but when it comes to faith, the usual tendency is to shy away from an overtly religious approach, often labelling Christianity as being outdated and not being in synch with their complicated lives. Whilst it's worth reflecting on this, it is also true that people were leading complicated and burdened lives when Jesus preached. What Jesus taught has survived many centuries; ideas and fashions have come and gone but the message of faith and the teachings live on. These

teachings are aimed at the very essence our being - parts of ourselves which even we don't understand.

Coming back to 'Normal People', what may have resonated with people who liked this drama is that it showed how emotionally fragile we all are. Something said or unsaid can so easily change the course of our lives. It is beyond doubt a moving story - but it is just that - a story, and this is how it was crafted by its author - Sally Rooney.

Real life, whether we like it or not, has many more dimensions to it – and some drama too. No one knows where our own stories lead to - apart of course from the Author of our lives. One thing we do know is that nothing can separate us from the love of God and through all the good and bad times we go through, the Good Shepherd walks with us.

Prawn Pasta Salad

- 1lb / 500g Pasta
- 4oz / 120g Cooked peeled prawns
- 16fl oz / 500ml Mayonnaise
- 2 Sticks celery
- 1 Red pepper
- 1 Orange pepper



Instructions

Boil the pasta until soft. Drain and leave to cool.

While the pasta is cooling prepare the other ingredients:

Wash and drain the prawns.

Chop the celery into thin slices.

Slice the pepper into small pieces.

When the pasta has cooled transfer to a large mixing bowl.

Stir in the mayonnaise.

Finally add the remaining ingredients and mix well.
