



A message from Archdeacon Andy



This week's gospel reading is the story of the vineyard owner, who seeks those who will work in his vineyard and to do a day's work and it tells of how through the day he goes to the marketplace to find those who are looking for work and employs them. At the end of the day those who worked for a few minutes at the end of the day, those who worked through the middle of the day, and those who worked all day, each receive the same wage. And many of us might read that parable with a sense of the injustice of those who had worked all day getting no more than those who worked briefly. It is not fair, it is unreasonable and yet we have to remember that this is a parable, it's a story.

And often in Jesus' parables, in Jesus' stories, he so seeks to illustrate the good thing he is trying to say, that he will pull out something negative to help us to understand. So, in the story of the lost son, it feels as though the elder brother gets a raw deal but actually what we're to look at, is how amazing the love of the father is to the lost son.

In this parable, we need to focus on the extravagant, the outrageous, the unexpected generosity, grace, and love of God. So, let us just remember the story again.

The labourers do as they do in an agricultural town, they gather at the beginning of each day, hoping that somebody will employ them for the day. And it is all a bit random, maybe, it is a bit like gathering in the school playground wondering who's going to be picked for the team.

I was certainly one of those who was amongst the last to be picked, to be the unwanted or the liability, rather than the asset to the team.

And the labourers are waiting to be picked, waiting for somebody to employ them for the day. Their lifestyle is this random lifestyle of day by day, they wait and see who will employ them for that day. And I guess that some workers would have been known for their productivity, for their enthusiasm, for their reliability maybe they did get picked first.

But this owner keeps going back and through the day at 9am and noon and 3pm and 5pm he keeps going back. Whilst the first people employed at the break of day have been given a contract, they will receive a denarius for their day's work.

These others are just told they will be paid what is reasonable. I guess they would expect a proportion of a day's wage tied in with the amount of work they have done. But at the end of the day each receives a day's wage.

For those who had worked all day their contract is on it what they had agreed is paid. The master has been reliable and has kept his word.

For those who have worked less than a day, they get what they need not what they deserve, but they get a day's wage which means that their families can be fed and that they can be cared for and looked after.

This parable is sandwiched by two similar phrases. At the end of Matthew chapter 19, Jesus reminds his listeners that 'many who are first will be last, and many who are last will be first.' And this parable ends in a similar way, 'the last will be first and the first will be last.'

And we know, and we see in this parable, that Jesus turns values upside down.

For the crowd listening to him speak, we have an employer who cares, an employer who is generous, an employer who keeps his word and so those will be upside down values. And then we have the complaint, the 'it's not fair', 'it's not reasonable'. We are reminded that the Kingdom of God works upside down, just as the last will be first and the first will be last; things do not work in quite the way we would expect.

It is not about merit, it is not about what we do, but it is about God's extraordinary, amazing, outrageous grace.

In a way for all of us, it is tough, because we are reminded that it is not about what we do, but about who we are. It is a reminder that God's love and God's mercy are undeserved, and that God blesses us even when we do not deserve it.

So, we pray: Lord thank you for this parable and teach us from it in our daily living but teach us in relation to you. To appreciate afresh your amazing grace, your extraordinary love, and your generosity to each of us.

Mission

<u>Update from our mission partner, Beryl Baker from her</u> <u>friend Eileen Hollingsworth</u>



Beryl is a nurse who works in Paraguay. She has been on the mission field for over 50 years and we have supported her as a mission partner throughout that time.

Dear everyone I had a lovely call from Beryl this afternoon. Beryl was in Asunción and she had spent the morning making sure everyone had her new phone number. She was speaking to me on WhatsApp so no charge to Beryl.

Her vehicle was now starting properly and she had driven down to the capital for five days. Her problem at her Asuncion house was the large sliding gate on her garden behind which she keeps the car safely. The gate had come off its runners and only with Beryl's help had Jorvy her caretaker who looks after the house in her absence, had not had the gate fall on him. Beryl had managed to get the gate secured and her friend Sylvia was going to organise a team of people to try and get the gate open again and secure the gate securely on its mounting.

Rhett is hoping to visit the ranch again and in the meantime most of the workers and their families will stay on the ranch. Like here in the UK the infection rate has gone up and there have been more deaths. Beryl at Rhett's request is getting the supplies for the workers and their families but she does get help from the workers and the staff at the shops to unload the supplies.

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Beryl can hold services and Bible studies for the women on her veranda.

PRAYER POINTS

Please pray for an end to the drought.

Pray for the people in Asunción who have a curfew every night from 8 pm till 5am the next morning.

Pray for all the children unable to go to school.

Pray for Beryl herself that she will remain in good health and she will continue to get her medical supplies.

Pray for the continued supply of good internet connections to enable her to keep in regular contact with her friends and colleagues and with contacts in the U.K.

Ask: What is going to be different to normal when you are at school? How do you feel about these changes?

Recognise the good and the bad

Try to find the positives in the midst of the change – talk about the many ways you have already adapted to learning at home during lockdown – why not write your own positive attitude mantra to use throughout the day!

Jeremiah 29 v 11


I have good plans for you, not plans to hurt you. I will give you hope and a good future. To your bubble!




Where Is God In All the Suffering by Amy Orr-Ewing

LETTER.

Dear Friends.

In the last few years a new word has been coined, it is "brinkmanship", a word which sums the agony and peril of millions of people who are again perched on the brink of war.

The trouble in Quemoy seems a long way off but for untold thousands it means at this moment undiluted horror, misery, bereavement, and destruction unlimited. Only a few weeks ago it was Lebanon's turn, and then that of Israel and Egypt, and before that Hungary. We easily forget! There was French Indo China, Tibet, and Korea, and the terror of Algeria today is penetrating to the capital city of our neighbours. All this, and very much else besides has happened within a span of thirteen years since the last great world war ground itself to a standstill.

What is the matter with the world? Is there no answer? Is it that the militant atheism of Marxist Communism, with its goal of world dominion by any means, is more attractive to the depressed nations than the West's way of life. Or is it possible that the professed Christianity of the West is now so threadbare as not to be worth having? One longs to see at least something of the fervour which Communists have for their cause (and it has all the power of a religious faith) evident in those whose heritage is Christian.

There is an answer to all these troubles, but not an answer that is likely to be acceptable to most, that is, a re-discovery of the God who loves and cares. This discovery is one which begins from a kneeling position and therefore will never be popular, but it is the only way. No one any longer believes that "man is the master of his destiny" nor that brilliant scientific progress will usher in "heaven on earth". The one hope for mankind is that they might discover the Power of God in their lives through the "Gospel of Peace", for He alone is the "Author of Peace", and His will is "Our Peace".

The Christian testimony today remains unchanged, "When He giveth quietness, who then can make trouble?" and again "Acquaint thyself with Him, and be at peace".

Notes for electoral roll form

- The only churches at present in communion with the Church of England are other Anglican Churches and certain foreign Churches.
- 2. Membership of the Electoral Roll is also open to members in good standing of a Church not in communion with the Church of England which subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity where those members are also prepared to declare themselves to be members of the Church of England.
- 3. Every six years a new roll is prepared and those on the previous roll are informed so that they can re-apply. If you are not resident in the parish but were on the roll as an habitual worshipper and have been prevented by sickness or absence or other essential reason from worshipping for the past six months, you may write "would" before "have habitually attended" on the form and add "but was prevented from doing so because" and then state the reason.
- 4. If you have any problems over this form, please approach the clergy or lay people responsible for the parish, who will be pleased to help you.
- 5. In this form, "parish" means ecclesiastical parish.

No person shall be nominated unless they have signified their consent to serve, or there is in the opinion of the meeting sufficient evidence thereof. No person shall be nominated if they are disqualified from serving by the Church Representation Rules. (See right for details)

DISQUALIFICATION (Church Representation Rule 68 in Part 7)

A person shall be disqualified from being nominated, chosen or elected or from serving as a member of a parochial church council, a district church council or any synod under these rules if the person:

- 3 (1) A person is disqualified from being nominated, chosen or elected or from serving as a churchwarden or a member of a parochial church council, a district church council or a joint council if the person is disqualified from being a trustee of a charity (and the disqualification is not subject to a waiver which permits membership of a parochial church council, district church council or joint council).
- (2) A person is disqualified from being nominated, chosen or elected or from serving as a member of a parochial church council, a district church council, a joint council or a deanery synod if the person is included in a barred list (within the meaning of the Safeguarding Vulnerable Groups Act 2006).
- (3) A person is disqualified from being nominated, chosen or elected or from serving as a member of a parochial church council, a district church council, a joint council or a deanery synod if the person has been convicted of an offence mentioned in Schedule 1 to the Children and Young Persons Act 1933 (with that expression being construed in accordance with Rule 71(2) of the Church Representation Rules).
- (4) A person's disqualification under sub-paragraph (3) may be waived by the bishop of the diocese by giving the person notice in writing.
- (5) A person is disqualified from being nominated, chosen or elected or from serving as a member of a parochial church council if the person has been disqualified from holding office under section 10(6) of the Incumbent (Vacation of Benefices) Measure 1977.

Note

In order to confirm that you are eligible to act as a charity trustee, all newly elected PCC members will be required to sign a declaration confirming their eligibility to hold office as a charity trustee eligibility (i.e. non-disqualification under charity law) and will be asked to sign a Fit and Proper Person declaration. A copy of these declarations can be found at
