





Poet's Corner

#### To Autumn

Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness. Close bosom-friend of the maturing sun; Conspiring with him how to load and bless With fruit the vines that round the thatch-eves run:

To bend with apples the moss'd cottage-trees, And fill all fruit with ripeness to the core;

To swell the gourd, and plump the hazel shells With a sweet kernel; to set budding more, And still more, later flowers for the bees, Until they think warm days will never cease,

This is one of my favourite poems. It is by John Keats. It was his last major work before he died in Rome from Tuberculosis in 1821 at the tender age of 25 years.

The poem is filled with highly sensuous language, laden with pictorial imagery and the sweet sounds of nature. He makes good use of alliteration throughout the poem. He speaks of Autumn and the ageing sun 'conspiring 'like two old friends with secrets For summer has o'er-brimm'd their clammy cells.to share. Use of the words load, heavy, swell

Who hath not seen thee oft amid thy store? Sometimes whoever seeks abroad may find Thee sitting careless on a granary floor, Thy hair soft-lifted by the winnowing wind; Or on a half-reap'd furrow sound asleep, Drowsed with the fume of poppies, while thy hook Spares the next swath and all its twined flowers: And sometimes like a gleaner thou dost keep Steady thy laden head across a brook; Or by a cider-press, with patient look, Thou watchest the last oozings, hours by hours.

Where are the songs of Spring? Ay, where are they? Think not of them, thou hast thy music too,--While barred clouds bloom the soft-dying day, And touch the stubble-plains with rosy hue; Then in a wailful choir the small gnats mourn Among the river sallows, borne aloft Or sinking as the light wind lives or dies; And full-grown lambs loud bleat from hilly bourn; Hedge-crickets sing; and now with treble soft The redbreast whistles from a garden-croft, And gathering swallows twitter in the skies.

and plump help us visualise the fully ripened fruits Juicy and sweet. Personification is used in stanza two. Autumn becomes a lovely woman, mature and carefree. She is sitting careless on a granary floor, her hair softly blowing in the gentle breeze. The stanza finishes with a pretty picture of her watching apple juice 'ooze'from a cider press. Stanza three begins by reminding us that Autumn is not envious of the songs of Spring. She has beautiful sounds of her own. The 'full grown lambs' bleat, the Robin whistles and migrating swallows gather and fill the air with a multitude of twittering. One of the most beautiful examples of pictorial imagery is the streaked pink clouds adorning the dyiny day' and gently illuminating the stubble fields.

I'm sure you will have no problem seeing why this is one of the most beautiful examples of a harvest time poem. God bless you all & keep you safe,

Nominees must be:

- at least sixteen years of age;
- actual communicants;
- on the Electoral Roll of this Parish for at least six months

Proposers and seconders must be on the Electoral Roll of this Parish

No person shall be nominated unless they have signified their consent to serve, or there is in the opinion of the meeting sufficient evidence thereof. No person shall be nominated if they are disqualified from serving by the Church Representation Rules. (See right for details)

#### DISQUALIFICATION (Church Representation Rule 68 in Part 7)

A person shall be disqualified from being nominated, chosen or elected or from serving as a member of a parochial church council, a district church council or any synod under these rules if the person:

3 (1) A person is disqualified from being nominated, chosen or elected or from serving as a churchwarden or a member of a parochial church council, a district church council or a joint council if the person is disqualified from being a trustee of a charity (and the disqualification is not subject to a waiver which permits membership of a parochial church council, district church council or joint council).

(2) A person is disqualified from being nominated, chosen or elected or from serving as a member of a parochial church council, a district church council, a joint council or a deanery synod if the person is included in a barred list (within the meaning of the Safeguarding Vulnerable Groups Act 2006).

(3) A person is disqualified from being nominated, chosen or elected or from serving as a member of a parochial church council, a district church council, a joint council or a deanery synod if the person has been convicted of an offence mentioned in Schedule 1 to the Children and Young Persons Act 1933 (with that expression being construed in accordance with Rule 71(2) of the Church Representation Rules).

(4) A person's disqualification under sub-paragraph (3) may be waived by the bishop of the diocese by giving the person notice in writing.

(5) A person is disqualified from being nominated, chosen or elected or from serving as a member of a parochial church council if the person has been disqualified from holding office under section 10(6) of the Incumbent (Vacation of Benefices) Measure 1977.

#### Note

In order to confirm that you are eligible to act as a charity trustee, all newly elected PCC members will be required to sign a declaration confirming their eligibility to hold office as a charity trustee eligibility (i.e. non-disqualification under charity law) and will be asked to sign a Fit and Proper Person declaration. A copy of these declarations can be found at

<u>www.parishresources.org.uk/pccs/apcms/</u>. By confirming that you are eligible for election, you are confirming that you are able to sign these declarations.
